COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed for future leaders of health care organizations to help them better understand the impact of the Affordable Care Act on Health Care Consumers and the Health Care System. The Affordable Care Act will be evaluated in both the context of Health Care Reform and Insurance Reform. Since the passage of the law, there have been multiple attempts to repeal the Affordable Care Act and the provisions of the law have been the subject of many Court Appeals including the Supreme Court of the United States. The Affordable Care Act is an important issue in the Fall Elections.

- 5) Evaluate provisions of the Affordable Care Act that should be considered for modification or deletion to improve the law.
