Course Description

This course provides an overview of the evolving structure of the US public health and health care delivery systems. It is designed for graduate students in health policy and management who plan to work in, manage, and lead hospitals, clinics or other health service organizations or in other administrative or policy positions. This course supports the effectiveness of health services managers, administrators and other professionals by providing knowledge of a wide range of health organizations and services and associated management and policy issues.

The course introduces the student to the major areas in health management such as planning, operations, human resources, leadership, finance, information systems & technology, and quality. In addition, the course emphasizes a number of policy topics associated with, for example, population health, recruitment of physicians and other allied health personnel, coordination across health and human services organizations, Medicare funding, and managed care.

Course Objectives and Student Learning Outcomes

The following MHA core learning outcomes will be addressed in this course. Students will:

- Demonstrate knowledge of the political and legal institutions of governance that influence health care administration
- Identify the main components and issues of the organization, financing and delivery of health services and public health systems in the US
- Demonstrate the ability to identify policy problems related to health care administration
- Describe the underlying assumptions and relationships that characterize the historical evolution and current state of public health services delivery
- Identify and describe the basic economic concepts involved in health services delivery to include payor sources, revenue generation and financial control functions
- Analyze health administration related policies and problems by applying appropriate professional and ethical standards
- Demonstrate a nuanced understanding of public service values salient to health administration such as accountability, equity, responsibility, and diversity

Grade Requirements for Graduation

To earn a graduate degree at the University of New Mexico, students must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.0 in graduate-level courses taken in graduate status at the time of degree completion as well as a grade point average of at least 3.0 for courses listed in their Program of Studies or Application for Candidacy. Students may not graduate with Incompletes or unrecorded grades (NR) pending in any graduate course, nor may they graduate while on probation. Courses taken to meet undergraduate deficiencies/prerequisites cannot be used to meet graduate degree requirements nor are they calculated into the graduate grade point average. It is expected that the student earns at least a B (3.0) in each of these courses. If a grade of less than "B" (3.0) is earned in any of these, the major department may deem that the prerequisite has not been satisfied. No more than 6 credit hours of coursework in which a grade of "C" (2.0), "C+" (2.33) or "CR" (grading option selected by student) was earned may be credited toward a graduate degree. Courses offered only on a CR/NC basis and required by the graduate program are excluded from this limitation.

Course Modality

This course is being scheduled as an O+C (Online + Classroom) course. In-person students (Section 001) will attend class face-to-face and remote students (Section 002) will attend via Zoom. For the Zoom meetings, you will need:
